A Message from the Principal

Dear Members of the SFX Community,

"TIME FOR A BREAK"

I feel certain that the advertising department for Kit-Kat would concur that each member of our community is indeed due for a well-deserved sabbatical. The last few months have tested the resourcefulness, patience, and commitment of everyone, as lockdown has continued to extend, while release has remained just beyond our reach.

Our Year 12 students in particular have had a difficult path to navigate with ever-changing conditions and regulations being applied to their HSC. Uncertainty is one of the greatest challenges for each of us in these difficult times, yet at every stage, our Year 12 cohort has handled themselves with patient grace – a trait that will serve them well as they venture further into the journey of life.

Nevertheless, in my assembly address last week, I called on them to take a break these holidays and, in keeping with our Marist theme for 2021, to breathe.

They have worked bravely in difficult circumstances and will now be required to continue their endeavours for longer than anticipated. It is important that they take some time out now to unwind, relax, and laugh, before they lift themselves at the commencement of next term for a final concerted effort.

TERM 4

It will certainly be an unusual start to Term 4 at the College with both Year 11 and 12 cohorts still engaged with learning. The current health advice would indicate a likelihood that the early weeks will continue to be dominated by online activities. At this stage, we await further advice regarding the requirements for a Covid-safe return to school later during the term.

Year 12 have now covered all of the required course content. Students will therefore move to an extended preparation period during which they are encouraged to seek support and advice from their classroom teachers as required.

To support the students in this preparation, we will be running an alternative online timetable during the initial weeks of Term 4 which will feature every examinable course. Students are invited to tune in for a range of activities as determined by individual faculties and teachers, ranging from seminars, lectures, masterclasses, interactive tutorials, and various other presentation forms. There will be three presentation timeslots each day which will allow students the opportunity to intersperse their own revision and practice with some input provided by College staff.

We are hopeful that this new structure might provide students with a good balance in their preparation and might re-energise them for the last stretch of their journey. It is also a structure that should stand them in good stead for studies later in life. The timetable and associated information will be provided before the commencement of Term 4.

Courses not requiring students to undertake an examination will not feature in this timetable, although there will be an opportunity for VET students to potentially complete competencies for their courses.

Under the current health advice, we are continuing to plan for a possible return to school for Year 12 students during Week 4, which will hopefully culminate in a modified Final Assembly and Liturgy. Year 12 will then have a final week of personal study preparation prior to the examinations in Week 6.

As you would be aware, the revised timetable for HSC examinations now clashes with our scheduled Graduation Dinner so this cannot proceed on the originally advertised date. We are currently considering alternative arrangements which will be dependent on the health advice once the examinations are completed.

Year 11 will commence their HSC studies in an online environment. New timetables reflecting class changes will be issued to correspond with the commencement of the HSC courses.

As always, these plans are conditional on current NSW Health advice updates and will be modified as required.

PERPETUAL DAY OF REMEMBRANCE

The Diocesan Perpetual Day of Remembrance occurs each year on 15 September. While the COVID-19 pandemic might make it difficult to mark this occasion in the customary ways, it is vitally important that we commit to stand alongside all those who have suffered and continue to suffer. May we be people of hope through our commitment to solidarity, prayer, and change.

ASSEMBLY OF CELEBRATION

We will be marking the final Friday of the term with a celebratory extended assembly. Year 11 and 12 will be invited to join us in the morning as all other classes will be cancelled for the day. We are looking to focus on a celebration of achievement for our Year 12 students as we acknowledge some of their achievements and work during their time at the College. We are looking forward to an uplifting and joyful conclusion to the term and I hope that all students will be able to celebrate with us.

This house helped with educational, religious and social services for women and children who were at risk of homelessness. and playing a Kahoot based on Catherine McAuley and her life achievements. First place from each Tutor Group then went in the draw to win a Keep Coffee Cup, where the winner was Ava Douglas! 

Some students have submitted compositions, and these are a clear example of the students' creativity and hard work.

Jack Hartigan (Year 12) Cricket



Jack developed a love of cricket at a young age. He was exposed to the game at 3 years of age by his dad and extended family. It was a given that he joined in when the family was 'mucking' around in the back yard and at the local park. By the age of six Jack was playing competition cricket.

His representative history is noteworthy. He has represented Newcastle from the age of 10 through to the age of 16. He has been involved in the senior Newcastle Rep squad which is made up of 26 players and which is then split up into two teams (Newcastle Blasters and Lake Mac Attack). Jack was picked for Lake Mac Attack in the NSW Men's Regional Bash who made the state final and played at the SCG in February this year.

Jack has also represented NSW/ACT Country U/17s at Nationals in Cairns and was captain of the team in 2019. In 2020 he played for NSW Men's Indigenous team in Alice Springs at the National Indigenous Cricket Championships. In 2021 Jack played for the U/19s NSW/ACT Country side where in one of the matches he scored 111 not out against NSW Metro. Other representative honours in 2021 include selection in the NSW/ACT Country U/19s for this and NSW Combined Catholic Colleges team.

When Jack plays Cricket he is not only representing himself but his indigenous heritage. His father's side of the family hails from the Goulburn region and are part of the Gundungurra people. His great grandmother was part of the stolen generation. Jack says that "anytime you're able to represent your culture it is pretty special".

Jack loves cricket as well as Rugby League. He relishes the team aspect of these sports. Representative cricket has also allowed him the opportunity to travel to places all around Australia. He has met many young people and developed lifelong friendships. His passion for cricket has extended to coaching. He has coached the Hamilton-Wickham Colts U/15's Division 1 side for the past two seasons. Coaching has allowed Jack to share his knowledge and skill set to a new generation of athletes. Watching the kids develop and seeing the excitement and enthusiasm for the sport grow gives him great deal of satisfaction.

Playing at an elite level comes with sacrifices. During the cricket season Jack trains 4 days a week and plays on Saturday and some Sundays. Training includes strength and conditioning and running sessions. This does not include normal team practice of batting, bowling and fielding. State teams commitments requires him to travel to Sydney for training camps once a month. Jack admits that he did not have a good balance between school and his sport in year 10 and 11. However, he has been working on managing his time better between school and sporting commitment as he moves towards his HSC Exams. Jack's goal is to make the U/19s NSW/ACT Country side again and go to the National championships. He has his sights set on being selected in the Australian U/19s side which will play in the World Cup in the West Indies in January 2022. When Jack has finished Year 12, he would like to move to Sydney and play Grade Cricket and hopefully gain a rookie contract with the NSW Blues men side.

The impact of Covid has had a significant impact on Jack's sporting competitions and opportunities: In 2020 he was unable to travel with the Australian U/19 Indigenous team to New Zealand where the team were to play the New Zealand Māori side in two one day games and a T20 match that was to be played before the which was to be played before the Australia vs New Zealand Game. The U/19s National championships in 2020 were cancelled as well as the NSW Indigenous men's tri series games against NSW Country, ACT and Qld country. However, these setbacks have not dampened Jack's enthusiasm for the sport he loves and his aspirations of representing Australia in Cricket. Good Luck Jack.

Religion Faculty


Yr. 12 Studies of Religion II Unit students have been enthusiastically applying feedback from their recent Religion and Peace assessment in a variety of ways. Some classes have been experimenting with form by scripting and recording a podcast which showcases their course content.

Students were set the challenge of creating the first instalment of a series of podcasts which was intended to provide expert knowledge and understanding of each HSC topic. Hypothetically, the podcast was to be broadcast on local Christian radio, Rhema FM, and was to be aired for the benefit of fellow students throughout the region. Along with addressing core outcomes, students were encouraged to share their love of learning- including that of other world religions.

Support was provided regarding how to script, record, and edit a Podcast, while laptops were used to access free sound recording software.

Peer / teacher marking discussions, which provide an invaluable learning opportunity, continue. Scout Brown's and Lachlan James' feedback on this project is very encouraging.
