The first was derived from a quote from the 2013 film *The Imitation Game* which captures elements of the life of Alan Turing. On a number of occasions in the film, we are reminded of our potential to be great through the simple reflection, *'Sometimes it's the very people who no one imagines anything of, who do the things no one can imagine.'* On their final day, just before they made their way through the staff guard of honour, I encouraged each of our students to continue their journey toward that which remains yet beyond our imagination.

Good morning SFX class of 2021 and all our teachers,

Unlike most of you, I actually had my first day of Kindergarten in England. In fact, it wasn't called Kindergarten, it was "reception". A mere 3 weeks into my experience of Big School, Mum delivered the shocking news that school would be closed for Three. Whole. Days. Not only that but we were completely snowed in and couldn't leave the house. To say I was devastated is an understatement. It feels like a lifetime ago, but at the beginning of Year 12 I made a speech asking you to be kind, put in the work, take up every opportunity, face challenges with bravery and be yourself. 260 days later and our time together is up, and there is not a doubt in my mind you all exceeded my expectations with overwhelming resilience and kindness.

If I had have said to you at the beginning of Year 11 that you would complete 86 days of schooling online, missed your Trial HSC, spend weeks on end without seeing your best friends, only be allowed to go 5km from your house, or even spent your 18th birthday in lockdown, many of you would have told me that you just couldn't do it. ASPIRE is again collaborating with internationally recognised Newcastle-based company Catapult Dance in 2022.

Building on the success of previous programs, the Create Choreographic Project will offer students enrolled in schools in the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle the opportunity to participate in an intensive contemporary dance and collaborative choreographic program.

Students will be provided with a dance and performance art experience that is inclusive, non-competitive, creative and collaborative, and that reflects the working processes of the professional industry. Students will be encouraged to have a voice, and present their thoughts and ideas in a studio setting at the end of the program.

The Create Choreographic Project will run from Monday 28 February 2021 to Friday 4 March 2022.

Dancers will be split into Junior (Years 4–6) and Senior (Years 7–12) groups to create an original piece to perform. They will work alongside professional choreographers at Catapult Dance's studio in Newcastle West.

Secondary students need to have dance training. Primary students must have a genuine interest in and flair for dance, but don't necessarily have to attend dance lessons outside of school.
