Charlie had a magnificent year in 2019, sweeping all before him in multiple events at the Diocesan, NSWCCC and the School Sport Australian Championships and was well on his way to achieving similar this year.

He did compete in the SSSA diocesan swimming carnival and broke records in the 17+50m butterfly and 200 IM. He took exactly 1 sec off the 200 IM record.

Charlie received a Blue for swimming in 2019, and a letter from Swimming Australia which recognised that "through Charlie's performances in swimming in the past year, he would in every likelihood have achieved qualifying standards to represent Australia at the now cancelled 2020 Junior Pan Pacific Championships in Hawaii".

Charlie also has verbally accepted a full swimming scholarship to the University of Alabama, in the US.

Leroy has represented the Diocese in athletics from 2015-2019. At the NSW CCC championships in 2019 he won gold in the 200m and the 400m, silver in the 100m, and was named 17 years age champion. He holds the diocesan record in the 400m. At last years NSW all school championships he again showed his talent in multiple events when he ran a personal best in the 200m to win a gold medal, a silver in the 100m and fifth in the long jump. As a result, he was selected to represent NSW at the Australian All Schools Championships in Perth in December 2019. He continued his outstanding form, securing silver medals in the 200m and 4x100m relay, and a personal best in the 100m. In 2019 Leroy received a Bar award (awarded to students who already have a Blue and have continued to *excel in their sport) Leroy recently started back at the* NSW Target Talent Program at Sydney Olympic Park. Selectors were also watching Leroy for selection in the U20s training squad for World Juniors. He is hopeful the World Junior Athletics Championships will be moved to 2021.

In 2019 Kate became the only player in 74 years of Newcastle Basketball to win three NSW State Championship titles in the one season as a member of the following teams – U18 Women, Waratah League Youth Women Division 1 and Waratah League ABA Senior Women.

In 2019 Kate represented NSW Country Basketball U18 Women at the Australian Championships in Townsville where she was listed as the top 3-point percentage shooter.

Kate was an integral member of the SFX team in 2019 who were NSWCCC runners up and was selected in the NSW CCC team that competed at the NSW ALL School Championships in Terrigal.

In February, this year Kate represented NSW at the U/20 Australian Basketball Championships in Canberra. The NSW team was placed 4th.

Well done to both girls on their outstanding efforts this year.

Be Aware

Be aware of the world around you; notice the changing source and the beautiful sights, smells and sounds as you do your daily activities. Notice how you feel. Try this as you walk, eat lunch or wait for a train. Being aware of the 'here and now' can help you feel calm and reduce stress.

This term, the Wellbeing Team have been focusing on the element "Be Aware" from the 5 Ways to Wellbeing Framework. In week one, the students took part in a New Beginnings Survey that sort information regarding how the students felt as they transition into their final year of study. Below are some of the top factors and data that the students provided from the survey. 220 students completed the survey.

Question: Things the students are worried about (Top 3 responses)

- Exams, assignments and schoolwork 37%
- Pressure to do well at school 18%
- Nothing has really stressed or worried them recently 11%

What have your students done about their worries? (Top 3 responses)

- Nothing about it 40%
- Talked to someone 27%
- They have been learning to live with it -24%

Who do the students go to when they are worried? (Top 3 responses – more than one answer could be selected)

- Parents/carers 51%
- Friends at school 46%
- Friends outside of school 27%

Areas where the students want to build their confidence (Top 3 responses – more than one answer could be selected)

- Studying 53%
- Dealing with stress 44%
- Being more organised 40%

Top three areas the cohort is the happiest with:

- Balancing time well
- Healthy eating
- Sleep or energy

In the past month, the students have been most worried about:

- Hurtful texts, messages, or comments being sent to them
- People posting things about them online
- Their peers calling them names or insulting them.

From this information, the Wellbeing Team established a series of Long Tutor Group lessons and activities centred around the concerns of the students. The goal is to slowly build a "Toolkit" of resources and information for the students to access for support. We have shown some of the key features of the lessons.

Sign up to eHeadspace

We are looking at utilising eHeadspace resources in the coming weeks. We would like all students to create their own log in account with eHeadspace. It is free and easy to use. Students will also be sent a link to their emails to complete the log in services. Encourage students to use their school email account when they register. https://headspace.org.au/register/

Scenario Based Learning activities

Students were given the opportunity to communicate their understanding of how to manage certain scenarios that relate to their current lives. Certain scenarios reflected; how to manage your social media accounts in regard to potential photos or information that may be harmful; changes that you may see in their peers and how to reach out for assistance; and personal safety when attending parties and functions with peers.

How to engage with social media appropriately

Students were given the opportunity to explore the psychological effects of social media. The key focus of this lesson was regarding how not all posts on social media are true and have a false imagery assigned to the post. Students were able to express how to communicate and use social media appropriately by only being authentic in posts and not engaging in "trolling" behaviour.

Gregson Park Remembrance Day Service Wednesday, 11 November 2020

College Captains **Ava Gidley** and **Jayden Wright** represented the College at this most significant event.







What'll happen to the Wattle??!

One Giant Leap Australia Foundation is sending native golden wattle seeds to the International Space Station in early December 2020.

In collaboration with the Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency (JAXA) the seeds will live in space for six months, returning to Australia in time for Science Week 2021.

Supported by the Australian Space Agency, the "What'll happen to the wattle??!" programme was offered to schools across Australia and we were thrilled that our application was successful! The applications included 200 words and a short video (some stills shown below), explaining what the schools would do with the wattle once it had grown and why we should be chosen. St Francis Xavier's College and other chosen schools around Australia will receive wattle seeds that have flown to space, plus seeds from the same lot that have not. We will be germinating and growing our seeds, recording data about the germination and seed growth. Data will be uploaded to the 'What'll happen to the wattle??!' app. Throughout the programme, One Giant Leap Australia Foundation will run teleconferences and provide educational support to participating groups.

The twelve-month to two year project will result in the creation of a nationwide map identifying the location of Australia's 'space wattle' trees.

The project is an historic opportunity for Australian schools, and students and our Science Faculty is very excited to be a part of this!

STUDIES OF RELIGION

Over the past two weeks Year 12 Studies of Religion 2Unit students have been learning about the significant practice of Wesak from the depth study of Buddhism.

Visible learning came to life in one of our classes last week. Some of our students took part in a Wesak ceremony and performed different ritual practices such as group chanting, bathing of the Buddha, prostration, making offerings to Buddha of candles, incense, flowers and fruit, and they concluded with a group meditation. From students performing such rituals and recognising certain symbols they were able to deepen their knowledge of the practice and develop a better understanding of key beliefs expressed in Buddhism.

Students were able to construct new knowledge by building on their current knowledge and therefore being able to make more sense of the practice. With the help of VET hospitality teachers, Samantha Middleton and Kerrie Burnes, the students worked morning shifts starting at 7.30 am over five weeks in the SFX Café providing morning sustenance for teachers and students.

Skills learnt included cooking and food prep of milkshakes, coffee's and toasties, use of the commercial dishwasher and combi oven, and café clean up processes all within work health and safety and Covid-19 safe procedures. Personal goals of self-management, hygiene, safe food handling and following workplace rules and employer expectations were achieved by all students who participated in the experience.

The Life Skills students also worked FRONT OF HOUSE in the café alongside hospitality students who mentored them in aspects of effective customer service.

One student, Aidan Barlow, said he liked the opportunity of "reaching new goals and learning proper work outside the classroom".
