GRADUATING ADDRESS BY GREG PTOLEMY, PRINCIPAL OF ST FRANCIS XAVIER'S COLLEGE FOR THE GRADUATING CLASS OF 2020

I have a suspicion that almost every farewell speech this year will make reference to an 'unprecedented' year. It is likely that many will speak of lost opportunities, before venturing down the path of the hope-filled possibilities that lie ahead. And these responses seem very reasonable to me, given the year that has been.

As I prepared to follow down this very same path myself, seeking profound inspiration and wisdom from some of the greatest minds in history...Cicero, Aristotle, Plato...I instead found myself drawn to Monty Python.

Now, I am painfully aware that some of our students may have never heard of Monty Python, but I am hopeful that our parents and carers might be able to explain something of their absurd humour to you. The Monty Python team had a wonderful way of inviting us to laugh in the face of adversity, to 'always look on the bright side of life' and thus their 'insights' seemed exceptionally fitting for this oration.

I am not sure about each of you, but I know that in my youth, every time I complained about the difficulties or challenges of life, I was quickly given a reminder of just how lucky I was. My parents (and teachers) never missed an opportunity to remind me that I didn't really know what hardship meant.

And it was this theme that was captured wonderfully by the Monty Python crew who teamed up with Tim Brooke-Taylor from The Goodies in the comic skit The Four Yorkshiremen.

In the skit, four elder statesmen are gathered, enjoying some quality wine together, and reflecting in awe at just how far they have come in life.

However, what begins as a shared story, quickly becomes a scenario of one-upmanship about how tough their individual lives had been in their youth.

In speaking of their poverty, one commences with the assertion that he was happy because his family had nothing! They lived in a tiny house, with holes in the roof.

In response, one of his colleagues suggests that his friend was lucky to have a house, as his own family of 26 lived in one room, with no furniture and half the floor missing.

Not to be outdone, a third member of the group insists that a room would have been palatial in his eyes, as his family only had a corridor.

The fourth and final member of the quartet counters that he could only dream of living in a corridor, as he lived in an old water tank on a rubbish tip.

Well, the initial teller of sorry tales, realising that his misery now seems paltry when compared to the others, restructures his version by suggesting that his 'house' was actually a hole with a tarp over it.

And so the storytelling becomes ever more absurd, as living in a small shoebox in the middle of the road becomes defined as 'luxury' by the man who had to live with his family of 150 in a rolled up newspaper.

Finally, they muse at the end of the sketch "you try and tell the young people today that...and they won't believe ya."

In a similar vein, I look back on the stories of my own parents and I must admit that I certainly didn't believe them either, for whilst they were not quite as expansive as the Monty Python crew, they also never let the truth get in the way of a good story, as I heard often about bareback horse riding to school or walking 14 kms each way every day.

And, of course, I have continued such traditions with my own family, telling my children that I had to ride a bike 20 kms in -4 degree temperatures, after which I had to sprint to catch up with the school bus, and leap on it while it was still moving because it didn't actually slow down for passengers...and then I would take out my Extension Maths homework that I hadn't been able to finish because my teachers had no idea how much time it really took...

I suspect that my own children don't really believe me either...

And why is this relevant to you, Year 12? Well, simply because I believe that you may be one of those rare groups in history who will never need to embellish your story – you will simply tell your children the truth...and they still won't believe a word you tell them, because this year has been nothing if not unbelievable...

You will not need to make up tales about walking to school uphill both ways in the snow to impress them with the hardships you faced, because you will regale them with the challenges of surviving Zoom lessons with staff who had no idea how to share their screens, impossibly poor internet connectivity (though I suspect that this was somewhat selective), physically distanced group work in Drama, ensemble Music performances by yourself, solitary isolation and confinement in your own houses, classrooms without teachers because they actually were not allowed to come to school, spraying down desks at the commencement of lessons, socially distanced examinations, individually packaged foods, and Zoom assemblies where you were asked to mime the Sub Tuum...Your major works requirements were modified, the Trial and HSC exams rescheduled...and you were taught that none of you knew how to wash your hands...You were socially outcast when your hayfever played up, contact sport was only possible as long as you stayed 1.5 metres apart, and you could only contact friends on social media rather than in person...You will even be able to tell them that you couldn't buy a toilet roll for a while there!

And your children simply won't believe you...

As I reflect back on all of the things that you have faced this year, I cannot help but sense the prophetic weight of the Marist theme for 2020, that somehow foresaw the events that were to take hold not just of our own lives, but of our entire world. I remember inviting each of you at the Commissioning Ceremony, to accept the challenge of this "one wild and precious life" and live it fully.

I now have a tremendous sense of awe at the way you have responded individually and collectively to this challenge.

I have a very real sense Year 12, that somewhere in the midst of all this turmoil, we have been presented with a unique opportunity to embrace a greater wisdom about what is important in life.

While there has been so much heartache in our world, we have been constantly reminded of just how vital social justice is, and why it is such an important tenet of our College.

We have seen individuals struggle with their mental health and been reminded just how important it is for us to look out for one another.

We have been invited to a renewed understanding of family and friends. During the initial COVID lockdown, I remember looking out of my front window at the park across the road from my home and seeing a host of parents playing games with their children. I had seen those children many times, but I had never seen their parents. While the situation was less than ideal across our world, people were finding good within it, and finding ways to reconnect.

I remember reading once that 'sometimes the worst things in life that happen to you can be the best things that happen to you, if you don't let the worst of it get the best of you'.

And as we have suggested many times this year, how you respond to circumstance is more important, more defining, more lasting than circumstance itself, and when you look back on this difficult time, how you emerged from it will help define you.

Year 12...Life will bring many opportunities and many obstacles. Pursue the opportunities; be persistent and patient as you learn through the obstacles.

Do not stress over the things that you cannot control, but control the things you can.

Remember to look out for others. If ever there has been a time to serve others, it is now.

Be good to people – not because you will reap a reward, but because ultimately, it is simply the right thing to do. If more people make such a choice, we won't be fighting over toilet paper in 2021.

Remember to wash your hands...and as you do, think of the great stories that you will tell your children and grandchildren because of this year...you will be richer and greater people because of these stories.

We are so proud of how you have journeyed with us, and of how you have risen to each challenge.

May God Bless you Year 12 and all the very best for the future.


eBOOK TRIAL

Jack Simmons Football

YEAR 12 FOOTBALL

Jack started playing football when he signed up with the U6's Kotara South Tigers team in 2008. The ability and skills he demonstrated in his younger years saw him progress through the representative ranks very quickly. He has been playing with the Newcastle Youth Team in the Northern NSW National Premier League since he was 15 and excelled in that competition.

In October 2018 Newcastle Jets awarded Jack a scholarship and contract and on 20 April 2019 and at 17 years two months Jack become the third youngest debutant in Newcastle's A-League history when he was selected in the Jets squad.

Jack played 20 minutes off the bench in Newcastle's penultimate-round 6-1 win against Brisbane Roar. His coach at the time Bernie Merrick said of the midfielder [number 10] "He's creative, he's quick, he's very good technically and he's a good dribbler, on the ball".

His other credible achievements include:

- Newcastle Jets FC U10's to A-League Squad 10 years.
- 2017 and at 15 years of age -selected in the Australian Joeys-U15's that competed at the world Cup qualifiers in Thailand.
- Member of the U17Australian team participated in a friendly tournament in Turkey.
- 2018 toured China with the Jets and came on as substitute to score a goal in Newcastle's 2-0 win against high-profile Super League outfit Shanghai Shenhua.
- Multiple features throughout Hyundai A-League 19-20 season on the bench.
- 2019 Hyundai A-League Debut against Brisbane Roar in a 6-1 win at Suncorp Stadium.
- Multiple preseasons games/FFA cup games with A-League squad including a goal on debut against Shanghai Shenhua in the Super Champions Cup tournament in Haikou, China.



• 2019 – selected in 30-player training camp held in Canberra (the first step towards selection in the Australian Joeys squad to compete against 23 other nations).

Before COVID and whilst completing his Year 12 studies, Jack was participating in Jets team training 4-5 times a week with a game on the weekend - including twice a week with the Jets senior squad and twice a week with the youth team. Team trainings were held in the morning and afternoons. Part of this training includes weights training. School holidays requires Jack to train full time with the Jets first team. However, when COVID restrictions 'spilled over' into the sporting arena Jack had to make a choice - train with the A team fulltime or finish his Year 12 commitments and train fulltime with the youth team. He chose the latter and as he said, 'a short-term sacrifice for a long-term goal'. When Jack completes Year 12, he will complete the remainder of his contract with Newcastle Jets FC.

Jack's schedule requires him to be super organised. He packs his lunch and college uniform before heading off to training and then school. Assisting him to manage his schedule are his family and friends. If time allows, Jack socialises with his mates on the weekend. This catch up allows him to take a breather from his studies and hectic sport schedule. Jack is very passionate about football. He has been playing nearly his whole life! He loves that football has allowed him to develop many friendships and presented him with the opportunity to play competitively both nationally and internationally. Jack's goals are twofold – firstly he would like to finish his Year 12 studies and gain entry to University and secondly, he would like to play professionally abroad. Watch this space!

Representative Surfing

SFX has a long and proud tradition in surfing, boasting a current QS level surfer, former CT surfers and of course a four time world champion!

However, our most recent success has been in the rapidly advancing area of women's surfing.
