A Message from the Principal

Dear Parents/Guardians, Students and Friends of SFX

Term 2 has commenced with a typically industrious schedule for staff and students alike at the College. The scope of these events has been quite diverse, and I would like to take a few moments to share some reflections on a few of these activities.

STAFF SPIRITUALITY DAY

The first day of term saw the staff engage in Professional Development with a focus on Spirituality. This is a core aspect of our commitment to Catholic education at the College and we were delighted to be able to spend the day with Mr Paul Harris from the Mission and Life Marist Formation Team.

Paul shared many stories and reflections with us, but there was one tale that I had not heard for a while that captured my attention. The story is attributed to American author Terry Hershey and is entitled The Cup is Full. Hershey writes:

An important and hurried and stressed businessman visits a Zen master, seeking guidance. (It seems that these days, to look important, you have to appear hurried and stressed.) The Zen master sits down, invites the businessman to sit, and pours the visitor a cup of tea. But even after the tea fills the cup, the Zen master continues to pour, allowing the tea to spill, now running over the entire table. The businessman is taken aback, "Stop! Please stop pouring the tea! Can't you see the cup is full, and obviously can't hold any more." The Zen master replies simply, "Yes. So, it is with you. And you will not be able to receive any guidance unless you make some empty space first."

I think that this simple story is a message for each of us. In particular, our students can be overwhelmed by the noise around them, and it can be difficult for them to know what is actually important.

It is why Year 12 are offered the opportunity to Retreat in the next few weeks. I had one Year 12 student ask me the other day if they could be excused from attending Retreat because they had important things to focus on like assessments. They were stressed and anxious, which I understood. Yet, the Retreat experience is designed to provide the students with space to breathe, to prioritise and ultimately become more effective at what they really need to do.

Terry Hershey in his reflection on the story notes that "...there is something alluring about filling empty space. And something very unnerving about being asked to empty (or let go of) whatever I've stockpiled to fill that space."

Year 12 are being invited to do just that...to let go of that which is unnecessary, to refocus, re-energise and recommit – we are looking forward to the experience with them.

ANZAC DAY

Our students and staff have been involved in a number of ANZAC Day memorials over the last few weeks. We were represented at the Newcastle Hunter Combined Schools ANZAC Day service by students who had worked on the committee to create the event, as well as members of the ASPIRE program who brought to life a meaningful and powerful dramatisation of the life of 104-year-old veteran Alf Carpenter. We also had students contribute to the day by assisting with front-of-house activities at the Civic Theatre.



Our students also led our reflective College memorial, while many more also participated in a multitude of other services throughout the city and surrounds. I was thoroughly impressed by the commitment of so many of our students to be active in these events, and I was equally proud to witness the solemnity and respect displayed by our entire community in marking this significant day.

DOMINIC HOUSE CELEBRATIONS

Our house structure at the College is centred around four significant religious and educational figures. St Dominic de Guzmán, the founder of the Dominican Order, is the patron of our 'Red' House and last week saw us recognise his contributions with a celebratory festive occasion. Our special celebrations incorporated learning about his life and contributions to society, intermingled with some fun community building activities. There were some wonderful moments that added to this sense of occasion by both students and staff, perhaps highlighted by the lunchtime karaoke – the talents on display were exceptional as was the overwhelming sense of community life. Thank you to everyone for choosing to be involved.

YEAR 12 REPORTS AND INTERVIEWS

Year 12 reports are about to be released for students and families. These documents should provide important feedback regarding progress and will hopefully provide momentum for the next stage of the HSC journey. Last week, our Anzac Committee told the incredible story of Alf Carpenter, on the last day of his 103rd year. As he was welcomed to the stage, there was barely a dry eye in the theatre, and he was greeted with a well-deserved standing ovation. During WW2, Alf fought in several of the major

conflict zones and his life story is one of great service in war and peace as well as his many other remarkable abilities.

Alf's amazing stories were presented in an integrated dramanarrative form which has been in the making since December 2019, having been interrupted last year but completed for 2021. It is with endless gratitude I commend the contributions of Angus O'Connor and Lachlan James who represented SFX superbly, tirelessly researching, developing, and working on staging this unique event. Many months of



team effort was the real reward for their commitment in bringing these stories to life and this occasion was exceptional.

After countless objections and a strong case put forward by the prosecution, we inched ahead to acquit our defendant of her charges. Our team consisted of our

Barristers, Catie Whitehead and Emma McNamara, instructed by Solicitor Declan Aislabie. They questioned their two witnesses, played magnificently by Brigitte Davis and Kade Cameron, with the court running smoothly thanks to Court Officer, Macie

In a very tight case, with the Barristers examining our witnesses, and cross-examining the other witnesses, who also had great acting skills, we came to our closing statements. We, the defence, argued that our defendant's statement was perfectly honest, and she did not intend to cause any disadvantage, granting us the acquittal. The Mock Trial scores revealed a 260-257 win over the opposition, affirming how good both sides presented that day.

50.3% received an ATAR of at least 70.00


65.6% received an ATAR of at least 60.00.

Michael Walker started playing basketball at 7 years of age and first represented the Newcastle Hunters at the age of 11.

Hot off the Press: Michael has been selected in the NSW Combined Catholic Colleges team which will compete at the All Schools Championships Monday 31 May.

One could say that Michael at 6 ft 7 and still growing is well suited to the game of basketball. But what has maintained is interest all these years is the fast-paced nature of the sport. He sees the game as constantly changing and keeps one engaged for the entirety of the contest.

Michael has been a Newcastle Hunters representative every year since 2014 and first represented NSW in 2017 when he was selected in the U16 NSW country team. Since then, he has been selected in the State team every year. He has also been part of the State performance program since 2017 and graduated in 2020. Michaels's talent as an Australian representative was recognised at a young age. He has attended multiple Australian developmental camps at the Australian Institute of Sport. His major accomplishment to date was when he was selected in the U15 Australian team in 2018 and won gold in the Oceania championship. Michael was then selected in the U16 team the following year and named in U17 squad that was training for the U18 World Championships to be held in Lebanon. Unfortunately, COVID-19 put a stop to all sporting activities including basketball and eventually the world championships were cancelled. Michael still is hopeful of representing his country and currently trains 6 days a week, completing over 20 hours weekly. His training consists of multiple on court sessions with various teams, as well as multiple gym sessions and personal cardio.

Like all elite athletes Michael must balance his sport and school commitments. He is able to do this by following a strict weekly plan. He always plans ahead by organising the scheduled activities for each day to maximise time efficiency. However, not all goes to plan and sometimes he will need to put in late nights to complete homework and assessments tasks.

2021 looks promising for Michael. After a rough start to the year, dealing with an inflammatory bowel disease, Michael was selected in the under 20's NSW State team that will compete at the Australian Championships in Mackay commencing from the 1st of May. Along with this he has also earned a place on the roster for the Newcastle Hunters championship men's team in his first year in the senior program. His short-term goal is to perform well at the upcoming Under 20' nationals as this is a gateway into future pathways such as American College and the Australian National Basketball League 1 (NBL1) opportunities. Following this, and in the next few years his goals are currently centred around playing NBL1, however if the COVID-19 virus situation continues to calm down in America, he would still like to pursue a College Basketball Scholarship in a Division 1 College.





Jemma Lucas has been selected in the NSW Regional Emerging Talent Team for Netball.

Jemma began playing netball at 6 years of age and first represented Lakeside at the age of 12. Jemma grew up watching her parents play netball and wanted to follow in their footsteps. She loves meeting new competitors and she also loves the friendships she has made over the years from all over Australia.

Jemma has been a Lakeside representative every year since 2015 and has represented Newcastle in 2020 and 2021. She was also invited to the Hunter Academy of Sport in 2018 and 2019 and was chosen to join the Metro League in 2018, 2019 and 2020. This year Jemma has been accepted into the Central Coast Metro League and is a training partner for the U23 Premier League on the Central Coast.

Jemma's selection into the NSW Regional Emerging Talent Team for Netball has been an ongoing process since last November with her initial selection in the NSW Emerging Talent Squad. She has continued training in Sydney with the Talent Squad through February and March and then final selection into this team which was announced last Friday.

This NSW Regional Emerging Talent Team will play against the NSW Metro Emerging Talent Team at the Australian Institute of Sport in July.

Jemma's goal is to perform well at Homebush as this is a gateway into futures pathways such as the Sydney Swifts and perhaps one day the Australian Diamonds.
